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Part 1: INTRODUCTION

1.3 SPC's Request for Quotation (RFQ) Process

At SPC, procurement valued at more than EUR 2,000 and less than or equal to EUR 45,000 requires an evaluation of at least three quotations to determine the offer that provides the best value for money through a Request for Quotation (RFQ) process.

This RFQ sets out SPC's requirements for a project and it asks you, as a bidder, to respond in writing in a prescribed format with pricing and other required information.

Your participation confirms your acceptance of SPC's conditions of participation in the RFQ process.

Part 2: INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS

2.1 Background

SPC invites you to submit a quotation to deliver the goods as specified in Part 3.

SPC has compiled these instructions to guide prospective bidders and to ensure that all bidders are given equal and fair consideration. Please read the instructions carefully before submitting your bid. For your quotation to be considered, it is important that you provide all the prescribed information by the closing date and in the format specified.

2.2 Submission Instructions

You must **submit your quotation and all supporting documents** in English and as an attachment to an email sent to logow@spc.int and with the subject line of your email as follows: **Submission RFQ 23-6061-Procurement of vegetable seeds to rehabilitate damaged vegetable gardens in Vanuatu**. The email should also be copied to <u>rfq@spc.int</u>.

The supporting documents expected in this RFQ are:

- <u>The Conflict-of-Interest Declaration form</u> completed
- A valid quotation that is responsive to the technical specification and evaluation criteria

Your submission must be clear, concise and complete and should only include a quotation and information that is necessary to respond effectively to this RFQ. Please note that you may be marked down or excluded from the procurement exercise if your submission contains any ambiguities or lacks clarity.

Bids will be evaluated on the basis of information received by **11.59pm Fiji time** on **10/12/2023**.

2.3 Evaluation & Contract Award

Each quotation validly received will be assessed against the evaluation criteria matrix set out in <u>Part 4</u>. Any changes in the evaluation criteria will result in the RFQ process being re-issued.

SPC may award the contract once it has determined that a bidder has met the prescribed requirements and the bidder's proposal has been determined to be substantially responsive to the RFQ documents, provide the best value for money (highest cumulative score) and best serve the interests of SPC.

In the event of a bid being accepted, procurement will take place under SPC's <u>General Terms and Conditions</u> <u>of Contract</u> and depending on the value or nature of the procurement, the award will be made by issuing a purchase order or a signed and dated contract, or both.

2.6 Legal and compliance

Confidentiality: Unless otherwise agreed by SPC in advance or where the contents of the RFQ are already in the public domain when shared with the bidder, bidders shall at all times treat the contents of the RFQ and any related documents as confidential. SPC will also treat the information it receives from the bidders as confidential.

Conflict of interest: Bidders must take all necessary measures to prevent any situation of conflict of interest. You must notify SPC in writing as soon as possible of any situation that could constitute a conflict of interest during the RFQ process. If you have any familial connection with SPC staff, this must be declared, and approval will then be sought for you to engage in the RFQ process. In support of your response to this RFQ, you must submit to SPC the Conflict-of-Interest Declaration form available on our procurement page website: https://spc.int/procurement.

Breach of this requirement can result in SPC terminating any contract with a successful bidder.

Currency, validity, duties, taxes: Unless specifically otherwise requested, all proposals should be in bidders' local currency and must be net of any direct or indirect taxes and duties, and shall remain valid for 120 days from the closing date. The successful bidder is bound by their proposal for a further 60 days following notification they are the preferred bidder so that the contract may be awarded. No price variation due to escalation, inflation, fluctuation in exchange rates, or any other market factors shall be accepted at any time during this period.

No offer of contract or invitation to contract: This RFQ is not an offer to contract or an invitation by SPC to enter into a contract with you.

Privacy: The bidder is to comply with the requirements of applicable legislation and regulatory requirements in force for the use of personal data that is disclosed for the purposes of this RFQ. SPC will handle any personal information it receives under the RFQ in line with its <u>Privacy Policy</u>, and the <u>Guidelines for handling personal information of bidders and grantees</u>.

Warranty, representation, assurance, undertaking: The bidder acknowledges and agrees that no person has any authority to give any warranty, representation, assurance or undertaking on behalf of SPC in connection with any contract which may (or may not) follow on from this RFQ process.

2.7 Complaints process

Bidders that consider they were not treated fairly during any SPC procurement process may lodge a protest. The protest should be addressed to <u>complaints@spc.int</u>. The bidder must provide the following information: (1) full contact details; (2) details of the relevant procurement; (3) reasons for the protest, including how the alleged behaviour negatively impacted the bidder; (4) copies of any documents supporting grounds for protest; (5) the relief that is sought.

Part 3: SPECIFICATION OF GOODS

A. Background/context

Cyclone Lola, Vanuatu:

Tropical Cyclone Lola, forming on October 22, 2023, near the northern tip of Vanuatu's Torba Province and making landfall on October 24, marked the third severe tropical cyclone to impact Vanuatu in 2023. Initially a category 5 cyclone, it was downgraded to category 3 but still wreaked havoc in Northern Vanuatu, causing substantial damage to houses, schools, infrastructure, plantations, and roads. Penama and Malampa provinces and the islands of Pentecost, Malakula, and Ambrym were among the hardest hit, with approximately 50% of homes damaged.

The Vanuatu National Disaster Management Office's NEOC Situation Report 07 - TC Lola (30 October 2023) provided a detailed account of Cyclone Lola's devastating effects on Vanuatu. The report highlighted significant agricultural damage, especially to root crops and vegetables, in regions like North Ambrym, East Vanua Lava, and East Gaua, where imminent food shortages loom. It also underscored the dire need for essentials like shelter, clean water, and medicine, noting the severe impact on many households and the continued use of evacuation centers. The report stressed the urgency of rapid assessment and response efforts, including the restoration of communication networks, road clearance for accessibility, and addressing health concerns stemming from the cyclone's impact.

The role of CePaCT:

The Centre for Pacific Crops and Trees (CePaCT), serving as the primary genebank for the Pacific region, plays a pivotal role in advancing agricultural development. Its fundamental mission involves the conservation and sustainable use of plant genetic resources for food and agriculture. The Centre's main aim is to enhance the availability, access, and utilization of high-quality, nutritious crops and valuable tree species across all SPC member countries, fostering resilience and improving the health and nutrition of Pacific populations.

In 2022, CePaCT received a substantial NZ\$10 million grant from the New Zealand government, via the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade. This funding, part of New Zealand's broader NZ\$1.3 billion climate financing (2022-2025), supports CePaCT's long-term conservation and effective utilization of Pacific food crops. This funding supports CePaCT's objectives under its Investment Plan 2019-2029, which are critical for agricultural resilience and food security in the Pacific.

Given its role on enhancing availability, access and utilisation of high-quality, nutritious crops, CePaCT, aims to provide targeted assistance through the procurement of vegetable seeds and, where necessary, planting materials of relevant roots and tuber crops to support the affected communities in Vanuatu.

Purpose of the RFQ:

This Request for Quotation (RFQ) aims to engage local partners in procuring vegetable seeds to support the communities most affected by Cyclone Lola, particularly in restoring damaged plantations and vegetable gardens.

In addition, this RFQ is issued by the Pacific Community (SPC) for the procurement of vegetable seeds as part of the assistance for Cyclone Lola affected communities in Vanuatu. The total budget allocated for

this procurement is 20,000 New Zealand Dollars (NZD 20,000). This document outlines the specifications, requirements, and conditions under which the procurement will be undertaken.

This support to Vanuatu, funded by the NZ-MFAT CePaCT grant, will be executed in collaboration with the Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (DARD), Vanuatu ensuring effective and strategic use of funds.

B. Functional Specification

• Purpose and Usage

The vegetable seeds are intended for agricultural restoration in regions affected by Tropical Cyclone Lola **priority 1 defined by NDMO**, with a focus on improving food security and nutritional diversity. Priority should be given to varieties that address the immediate and long-term agricultural needs of the affected communities in Vanuatu, particularly those rich in essential nutrients to enhance the dietary quality of the local population.

• Seed Selection:

Seed varieties must be chosen based on their suitability and adaptability to the local agricultural conditions of Vanuatu. Bidders are required to conduct comprehensive research and leverage relevant agronomic data in their selection process. This should encompass considerations of climate compatibility, resistance to local pests and diseases, adaptability to typical tropical soil conditions, expected germination rates, nutritional value, and potential crop yield. Bidders must provide a rationale for the selected varieties, clearly demonstrating how they meet the specific environmental and agricultural challenges in the cyclone-affected areas. The goal is to ensure that the chosen seeds effectively contribute to the recovery and sustainable development of agricultural practices in these regions.

C. Design Specification

• Seed varieties:

The proposed seeds should include Chinese cabbage, Beans, Capsicum, Watermelon, Pumpkin, Cucumber, Corn, and Peanut. The varieties selected should be designed for optimal growth in tropical conditions, considering factors like temperature tolerance, moisture requirements, and resistance to local pests and diseases. Please refer to the table below for the detailed quantity requirements for each vegetable crop.

• Resilience and Growth cycle:

Seeds must demonstrate resilience and the ability to grow year-round, addressing continuous food supply needs. Consideration should be given to the growth cycle of each variety to ensure staggered harvesting and a consistent supply of food.

D. Technical specification

• Germination Rate:

A minimum germination rate of 85% is required for all seed varieties to ensure a high probability of successful crop yield.

• Production and availability:

Seeds should be sourced from locally available sources and comprised both local and imported varieties ensuring a diverse and high-quality selection. They should be available for immediate distribution through established networks or trusted suppliers.

• Packaging:

Packaging for the seeds must be designed to protect them from humidity and other environmental factors that could compromise their viability. The packaging should also facilitate easy handling, distribution, and storage.

• Quality Assurance:

The quality of seeds must be assured through rigorous testing and verification processes to meet the specified germination rate and resilience criteria. In addition to germination rates, bidders must consider the following criteria for seed selection: resistance to local pests and diseases prevalent in Vanuatu, adaptability to the local climate and soil conditions, and the potential yield of the crops. These factors are critical to ensure the seeds' suitability for the specific agricultural conditions in the cyclone-affected areas.

E. Delivery Requirements

The successful bidder is expected to deliver the procured seeds to DARD's offices in Tagabe, Port Vila, Vanuatu. Bidders are expected to provide a delivery schedule in their proposal submission under this RFQ.

F. Budget and Value

The total budget allocated for the procurement of vegetable seeds under this RFQ is 20,000 New Zealand Dollars (NZD 20,000). Bidders are requested to provide their quotations within this budget, ensuring that the proposed cost includes all charges such as delivery to DARD, handling, and taxes where applicable. The quotations should reflect the best value for money while meeting the specified quality and delivery requirements.

G. Scope of Bid Price and Schedule of Payments

SPC's preferred payment terms is 30 days upon delivery and invoice. However, for this procurement the following schedule of payment is proposed:
